



ROLLINS FORD ROAD OPENS TO PUBLIC

Lorton, VA - July 22, 2014 - On Tuesday, July 15th, the Prince William Board of County Supervisors held a ribbon cutting ceremony to open Rollins Ford Road. The \$15 million Rollins Ford Road Improvement Project is part of the 2006 Prince William County Bond Referendum and consists of the widening of Rollins Ford Road to a four-lane divided roadway from Vint Hill Road to the intersection of Song Sparrow Drive and Yellow Hammer Drive. This project also includes the construction of two 365-ft bridges spanning Broad Run, the construction of northbound lanes on Rollins Ford Road from Yellow Hammer Drive to Estate Manor Drive, the widening and reconstruction of a section of Vint Hill Road, and site preparation at the future site of the Rollins Ford Community Park.

The project which was designed by Rinker Design Associates (RDA) and awarded to Shirley Contracting Company, LLC for construction. Prince William County's Department of Transportation in coordination with the Virginia Department of Transportation were responsible for project administration.

The addition of Rollins Ford Road gives drivers another cross access point between to Route 28, via Linton Hall or Vint Hill Road. The local cross roads which make up this road grid were all constructed or improved in the past 10 years. Now Sudley Manor Drive, Glenkirk, Devlin Road and Rollins Ford provide viable options for local drivers to move freely around the county and reduce traffic density and impact upon local communities.

"I'd like to thank the citizens of Prince William County for their foresight in approving the 2006 Road Bond which helped to finance this newest corridor to facilitate community and provide access to additional leisurely opportunities for area families. The partnership between the citizens, Prince William County Department of Transportation, VDOT and the contractors RDA and Shirley Contracting Company, LLC culminates today with the grand opening of Rollins Ford Road to the public.
